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Murano sommerso glass perfume bottle sculpture by Luigi Onesto (LO13), circa 1985

Signed by the master Luigi Onesto and pulsing with style a sculptural perfume bottle sculpture in shades of intense blue and violet. The stopper is a separate piece of glass that sits on the neck, and whilst it cannot be used for scent will slide out of the square shaped base preserving the illusion of a functioning bottle.

A sculptural piece with no purpose other than to declare its coolness, this work attributed to the great Luigi Onesto is porbably by his Oball glassworks founded by him in 1970. The purple pink and blue submerged colours pulse with the light.

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A Murano sommerso glass vase by Luigi Onesto (LO7), circa 1985

circa 1985 glass, silver plate 18cm × 14 cm × 6 cm \$1,550.00

A classic example of the work of Onesto and the sommerso technique, this heavy vase has a core of violet glass encased in blue and pink and clear glass. It has a great sense of solidity and weighs just over 2 kg, and is signed by the master on the base, editioned 1/1 and still has its Oball sticker, a must to keep for serious collectors.

Small but perfectly formed and preserved this geode bowl, originally an ashtray, still has its original label and was made by sommerso pioneer Antonio da Ros for the renowned glass firm Gino Cenedese in the 1960s. With a cobalt blue centre and amethyst sides it has a gem like quality and is a rare find.

Small but perfectly formed this half ovoid bowl, originally an ashtray, is by sommerso pioneer Antonio da Ros for the renowned glass firm Gino Cenedese in the 1960s and is signed "Cenedese" to the base. The cobalt blue centre, aqua green sommserso layers, and half egg shape makes it a wonderful and intriguing object for any modern tablescape.

Simple outlines and solid shapes are important for classic sommerso pieces, allowing the layered tones of the submerged colours have free rein. This classic vase of simple circular outline has the an elegant flourish of glass on its rim, and the blue colour ways suggest a suspended water droplet. It is signed to the base 'L. Onesto, Murano' with the original Oball labels.

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A Murano glass vase attributed to Fulvio Bianconi for Venini (FB003), circa 1955

This sculptural glass vase is called "forato"- Italian for "drilled", no doubt referring to the holes that make up an important part of the design. It is a forest green glass overlaid with clear glass and though unsigned it is attributed the iconic maker Fulvio Bianconi (1915-1996) who made his name creating glass masterpieces with Venini. The design can be found in several books on Murano glass including the Venini "catalogo ragionato" and Franco Deboni "Murano 900".

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A unique Murano sommerso glass vase by Gino Cenedese (GC001), circa 1960

Probably a sample piece created by the master Gino Cenedese himself as a guide to other glassblowers, this tall and elegant piece has a pear-shaped blue body with a dark grey/black elongated neck, contrasting with the solidity of the conception. This unique vase has its original Cenedese Vetri label to the base and number 1783/2. Founded in 1946, Ars Cenedese Murano, has always been at the forefront of traditional glassblowing excellence, as well as being open to the inspiration of contemporary art, creating a position at the forefront of artistic glassmaking.

Attributed to Fulvio Blanconi and Venini, a bottle shaped creation in inky blue glass with a "forato", or dimple that it encased in clear glass. Of an organic sculptural form it has a mouth like opening and great heaviness to hold.

Michele Onesto uses dark and mysterious black glass to form
the beating heart of this sommerso vase, encasing it in red
and clear glass to create a truly enigmatic object. For
collectors it has all the desirable original labels: "Vetro
Artistico Murano" and "Murano Vetro Artistico Oball" and is
signed to the base "Michele Onesto".

This heart shaped vase, is centred with an intense sommerso red core, offset with a blue and faint yellow layer and a clear base. It is signed to the underside "Michele. Onesto". The son of Luigi, he grew up learning the glassblowers' skills from his father which he continues with his own personal aesthetic.

A teardrop shaped vase, with intense sommerso colours of red, yellow and blue, signed on the base "L. Onesto, Murano". The asymmetrical shape complements the amazingly vibrant blood red and deep blue submerged colours with a flash of palest yellow to create a remarkable work of power and contrasts. Collectors note that it has its original Oball and Murano Certified labels.

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A Murano sommerso glass vase attributed to Luigi Onesto for Ogetti (OG001), circa 1975

Unsigned but attributed to the master Luigi Onesto this teardrop vase glows with the bright red core flashed by yellow layers and then encased in clear glass to magnify its intensity. It was retailed by Oggetti who were renowned for their selection of art glass and supplied by Onesto for years.

Sommerso continues to excite and intrigue the Murano glass artists today, and Alessandro Mandruzzato, (b.1970) is a master glassmaker and a member of the family that has been part of the art glass business for four generations. This vase is a more contemporary take on the sommerso technique, with a baluster outline and flat textured sides, it has an orange/red core submerged yellow glass then in pale blue glass.

Sommerso continues to excite and intrigue the Murano glass artists today, and Alessandro Mandruzzato, (b.1970) is a master glassmaker and a member of the family that has been part of the art business for four generations. This unique pair of vases are a more contemporary take on the sommerso technique with their sinuous outline and flat sides, orange/red core and coloured textured sides they evoke the Memphis movement.
